### Scholarship and Financial Aid Tips

1. *Prioritize* – Start with the FAFSA and/or the CSS. Then explore the scholarships/financial aid available at the colleges of interest. After exploring all the resources at the colleges, visit scholarship search websites.
2. *Contact your admissions counselors* – Most of your scholarships will come from the colleges. Talk to your admissions counselors.
3. *Fill out the FAFSA early* – The FAFSA is now available on October 1<sup>st</sup>.
4. *Search for community scholarships* – Search for scholarships in your community. (organizations, companies, churches, etc.)
5. *Set up a time to work on scholarships* – Set up a time in your week to work on scholarship searching and applications. I would recommend spending around 30-45 minutes a week to work on scholarships each week.
